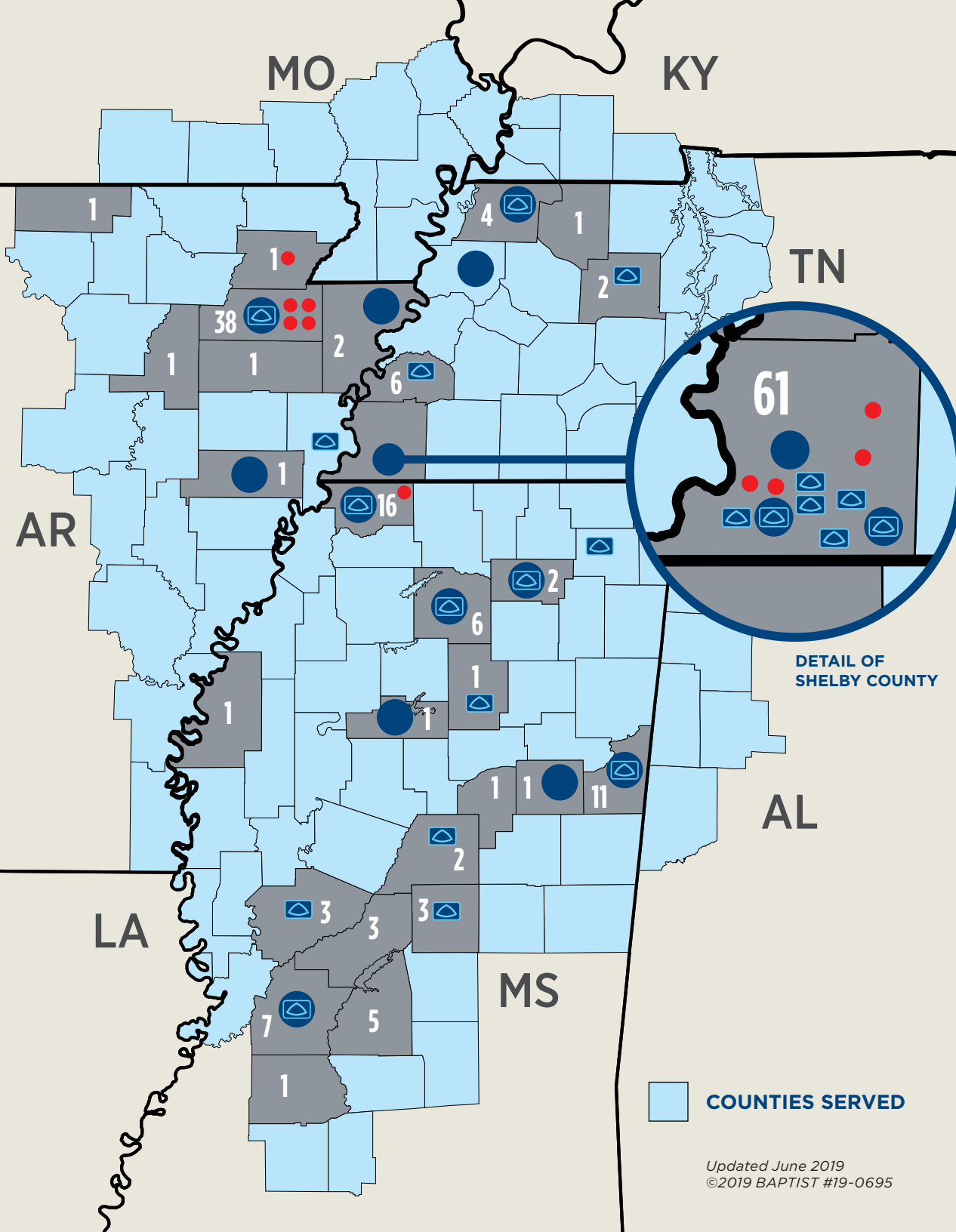

One of the country's largest not-for-profit health care systems, Baptist Memorial Health Care offers a full continuum of care to communities throughout the Mid-South. Started in 1912 in Memphis, Tennessee, by the Southern Baptist Conventions of Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee, Baptist is governed by the Baptist Memorial Health Care board of directors and led by President and CEO Jason Little. Baptist remains committed to its founding mission of healing, preaching and teaching and providing quality health care to its communities.

Accolades, Notables and Recognition

- Baptist's subsidiaries include Baptist Health Services Group and Baptist Medical Group. BHSG contracts with more than 5,000 licensed providers, 50 hospitals and 175 ancillary facilities. BMG is a multispecialty physician group with nearly 700 providers and 200 clinics.
- Baptist Memorial hospitals' specialty centers include Accredited Chest Pain Centers, an Advanced Primary Stroke Center, a Diabetes Education Center, an Epilepsy Monitoring Unit, Grief Centers, a Headache Clinic, a Heartburn Treatment Center, a Heart Institute that performs certified adult heart transplants, Sleep Disorders Centers, Weight Loss Centers and a Women's Health Center.
- Baptist Cancer Center provides world-class cancer care close to home throughout Baptist's three-state region. In 2014, BCC was one of only 12 centers distinguished as a site to spearhead clinical research on disparities in cancer care under the National Cancer Center's Community Oncology Research Program, known as NCORP.
- In 2015, Baptist Memorial Health Care and Semmes Murphey Clinic partnered to form the Brain & Spine Network. The network provides access to high-quality brain and spine care to support patients and families — from prevention through long-term care.
- Baptist Women's Hospital is the only freestanding women's hospital in the region. It is a founding member of the Council of Women's and Infants' Specialty Hospitals, and it is the only hospital in the Mid-South that meets the qualifications for membership.
- The Baptist College of Health Sciences was started in 1912 and offers 13 majors in nursing and allied health, including undergraduate and graduate degrees. In 2017, the Memphis Business Journal ranked the college first among Memphis-area colleges and universities for best return on investment. Based on a comparison of postgraduate earnings with cost of attendance, Baptist College alumni earn more than graduates of any other college in the area.
- Baptist opened Baptist Reynolds Hospice House — the Memphis area's first residential hospice facility in 2010.
- Baptist started the area's first children's grief camp in 1999, and opened the Kemmons Wilson Family Center for Good Grief in 2005. Baptist's Centers for Good Grief provide free grief services in Collierville, midtown Memphis and Jonesboro, Arkansas.
- Baptist partnered with Christ Community Health Services on Baptist Operation Outreach in 2005. Baptist Operation Outreach is Memphis' largest health care provider for the homeless, and Baptist has provided free health care to Memphis' homeless community since 1997 when it opened the HOPE Health Center for the Homeless.
- Baptist was the first health care system in the region to offer access to the Epic electronic health record system, the most widely used and comprehensive EHR in the country. Through Baptist OneCare, powered by Epic, providers can securely access a patient's complete medical history in real time. And through the patient portal, Baptist OneCare MyChart, patients can access their medical records wherever they are.
- Baptist has established a comprehensive telemedicine program that gives patients in any location access to world-class medical specialists. Through virtual consults and remote monitoring, patients can receive the best care in the optimal environment for them. Baptist's TeleHealth program includes TeleGuardian e-CIU, TeleMatters, TeleNeurology, TelePharmacy, TelePsych and TeleStroke.
- From a central location, Baptist's Patient Placement Center uses TeleTracking to optimize patient flow and admissions. This system streamlines patient flow, ensuring quicker admission times, efficient transfers and appropriate levels of care.
- To improve transparency and help patients make informed decisions about the cost of care, Baptist was among the first health care systems in the country to offer an online out-of-pocket medical cost estimator tool.
